Mayor Rilling Provides Local Update on Coronavirus

(Norwalk, Conn.) - City officials are working closely with partners at the state and federal levels, as well as partners in Norwalk, to monitor and respond to COVID-19, the 2019 novel Coronavirus. Statewide updates can be found online at ct.gov/coronavirus. Mayor Rilling provided the following Norwalk-area specific updates regarding COVID-19 coronavirus as of 8:00 p.m. on Wednesday, June 24, 2020:

- Since yesterday, there are three new positive cases in Norwalk, bringing the total positive reported cases to 2,071. There were no new deaths reported.
- While the Norwalk Public Library remains closed to the public at this time, residents can request a library card online. Visit norwalkpl.org to request a library card and gain access to thousands of materials through the digital library, such as eBooks, graphic novels, and audiobooks.
- The Connecticut Department of Motor Vehicles reopened select offices for in-person services, however due to the pandemic customers are required to make appointments in advance. Many DMV transactions can be completed online and do not require an in-person visit. The Norwalk DMV is open for learner's permits and knowledge testing at this time. More details can be found at ct.gov/dmv.
- Mayor Rilling held a Town Hall tonight to announce the creation of an Equity and Justice for All Committee in Norwalk, and spoke of some immediate steps the City is taking to address inequality. In the coming weeks, a Request for Proposal will be published to bring a consultant on to help guide the work, keep deadlines, and work closely with community volunteers. - Governor Ned Lamont joined the governors of New York and New Jersey today to announce a mandatory 14-day quarantine for out-of-state visitors coming to the tri-state area from states with high coronavirus infection levels. More details can be found at ct.gov.


“The tri-state area was one of the hardest hit areas for COVID-19 infections, and we worked together as a region to make tough decisions to help bend the curve and slow the spread of coronavirus. Norwalk, and our state, is moving in the right direction, and as the summer gets underway, and tourist attractions open up, it is important that those people from high-infection areas to take precautions,” Mayor Rilling said. “I appreciate Governor Lamont, Governor Cuomo, and Governor Murphy continuing to work together to help keep our community safe. We have all worked hard to slow down this virus, and unfortunately, other states are not taking this as seriously as we did here in New England.”


Number of Norwalk COVID-19 Cases by Date of Specimen Collection
